On 5 May 2002 the Lutherans for Life Chapter became official—17 years ago. Through the years there have been many challenges and changes. A small core of members met on April 14th to discuss our “dilemma.” We had excellent discussion from all those present. Some of the activities that have occurred this year include the following:

Elise Spleiss from Messiah, Citrus Heights, participated in the West Coast Walk for Life in January—her first time. Fees were paid to keep our website online.

Linda Cruz completed all the paper work for the IRS or whomever.

Lois Brauer contacted the National LFL for information pertaining to suicide in response to a request.

A phone call from a teacher at St. Peter Lutheran School, Lodi, requested information about an essay writing contest being held by our National LFL came to Zion’s office. Lois picked it up and was able to get the necessary information to the teacher. If one of her students should win, that child would receive a certificate and be recognized at our Regional Conference next November.

Richard Hintz continues to keep the LFL tract racks filled with good information for the congregation members.

Lois is serving as a member on the Elder Clergy Committee with Senior Care Solutions which puts on an annual event each September to help clergy and/or congregational leaders minister to the elderly in their congregations.

Pastor Colter has been talking with other pastors about the life issues we face and has found a number of pastors interested in our Chapter’s ministry.

Lois has obtained names of a number of new contacts to whom we can reach out & see if we might get some new members.

Val Brauer with Timothy and their three children participated in a Walk for Life on April 13. Val raised \$575 for the Pregnancy Center in Tracy. Thank you for your love and passion.

At our meeting on April 14th, we discovered that the Lord is placing some exciting things to our Chapter and if God so wills, we can continue being an active Chapter. If not, it may mean we have to shut the door till a more opportune time.

- We have \$6,735.96 in our treasury.
- At our meeting we decided to give a donation to the Elder Clergy Committee/Event to help defray their expenses of putting on the event. The event is free to those who attend. Last year we donated \$250 and also had a table of tracts and information available to the attendees. This gets our name on the program so we get more publicity. The response was awesome as those who picked up the brochures indicated how helpful they would be. That included a couple of doctors who said that the brochures encouraged them to remain faithful to God in a medical field where that is very challenging today.
- There is going to be a Regional LFL Conference, “Did God Really Say ...?” in San Francisco on November 16. We are hoping to have one of the speakers come to Sacramento the next day to speak to those who might be interested in learning about LFL & a lot more. This is still in the planning stages but we certainly are hoping it will occur.

- Richard Hintz will contact other congregations to see if we can put up tract racks with LFL brochures/tracts.
- We discussed the need for having members from other congregations; and this could include other denominations. However, only Lutherans can hold a position as an office.
- Since we had only one officer present at this meeting, we decided to make PRAYER for our Chapter a part of our daily lives. We specifically want to ask God to send us people to become members but who would also be willing to be leaders. We especially want to reach out to other congregations.
- All those present were asked to invite and encourage others we know or whom we meet to attend our next meeting on May 18th, 11:00 a.m. – 2 p.m., at Brookfield's on Madison Avenue & I80, Sacramento. Guests' meals will be provided at no cost.
- Richard and/or Lois will look for the officers' job descriptions.
